Church and Society

In his book entitled **Kingdom Agenda**, Dr. Toney Evans informs us that the role of the church is to "disciple individuals and families in such a way that they learn how to progressively bring every area of life under the lordship of Jesus Christ." The church itself is to be looked to as an expanded household or collection of families under God's kingdom authority and truth (note: I Timothy 3:15).

In order to achieve this goal, the church is to be the primary context for its members to share in the four biblical experiences as outlined in Acts 2:42-47. These are worship (celebrating God for who He is, what He has done, and what He promised to do), fellowship (sharing the life and love of Christ among the members), education (teaching and training toward a biblical worldview), and outreach (witnessing to the unchurched and unsaved in word and deed). The church is the place where the kingdom of God is corporately made manifest. The proper functioning of the church is crucial since it is the church family that marches into eternity.

Additionally, the church is to be the primary collective expression of the Kingdom of God in history. It is where the principles, precepts, and values of the kingdom are put on public display for the world to observe, so that if any problem or need in society exists, all they need to do is watch the church in action. (Matthew 5:13-16)

Only the church possesses the keys to the kingdom, to access heaven's authority in history. Your involvement in the local church is critical to exercising your own personal spiritual authority as well as the corporate spiritual authority of the church.

In the wake of numerous challenges that face our churches, it is imperative that we take a critical look at what we as the church are doing in our communities and how they are impacting us individually and collectively.

Over the next couple of months, I want to ask and answer five tough questions that challenge us and our churches as we move forward into the 2nd decade of the 21st century.

Tough Question One: How do We Move from Churchianity to Christianity?

The current church culture in North America is on life support. It is living off the work, money and energy of previous generations from a previous world order.

The death of the church culture as we know it will not be the death of the church. The church that Jesus founded is good; it is right. The church established by Jesus will survive until He returns.

A Theology of Mission: We need to recapture the mission of the church. In both the Old and New Testaments, we encounter a god who is on a redemptive mission in the world. The central act of God in the Old Testament is the Exodus -- a divine intervention into human history to liberate His people from oppression and slavery. God did not give up on His mission in the Old Testament when Israel refused to partner with Him.

When Jesus came on the scene, He entered a world very similar to our own in terms of its spiritual landscape. Jesus tapped into the widespread sentiment of disillusionment not with religion but hunger for God with His teaching about the Kingdom of God and how people could become a part of it.

The movement Jesus initiated had power because it had at its core a personal life life-transforming experience.

The appropriate response to the emerging world is a rebooting of the mission, radical obedience to an ancient command, a loss of self rather than self-preoccupation, concern about service and sacrifice rather than concern about style.

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Inside the Shelter: Insight from Winnie's Place Staff and Volunteers

We're going to be doing a series of interviews with staff and volunteers from Winnie's Place. This month, we interviewed Corretta Nunn.

Why do you work at Winnie's Place?

"I'm helping somebody. I'm always looking for somebody to help. I've been through what these ladies are going through. I haven't been homeless. I know what it's like to be broken. I know what it's like not to have my family around because my family lives in Tennessee. Sometimes, I feel like they just need that extra push and they need some nurturing and they need some guidance in order for them to be successful and moving out of here."

Is there a program that clients go through?

"We have a program where they have to have a plan when they come in here to look for housing...to look for a job if they don't have a job." Corretta explained further, "It's kinda like these ladies...they're not children. They're not our children but sometimes, they need hugs. They need to be nurtured but sometimes, they need direction."

Client plans are based on the needs of the individual clients and vary based on those needs. Winnie's Place helps clients learn skills, like housekeeping skills, parenting, job skills and job search skills. There is a group Bible study once a week that is led by Minister Angie and Minister Candice of Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church in East Moline. Once a month, clients come together for a community meal at the shelter. Clients and their children are expected to help with the meal. Clients are expected to go to church on Sunday.

Clients are also expected to make a schedule weekly that shows what they are doing on a daily basis. Clients work with staff to create their schedules. Corretta explained, "We help them and show them...we direct them on how to make things a little simpler." After discussing the schedule, Corretta said, "We expect for them to follow through."

Positive changes are happening for clients. One client is close to getting her GED. Three of the children living in the shelter are going to be baptized soon.

Tell me about donations...

The shelter is consistently blessed by donations from the community. "Everyday we get something," Corretta enthused. Currently, there is a need for toilet paper, paper towels, soap, laundry soap, garbage bags, dishwashing liquid, tall kitchen bags, Ziploc bags, bleach, Pinesol, and bagged salt for melting snow and ice.
