Our food pantries had to adapt also. These changes ranged from limiting service to one family allowed in our pantries, pre-packaged food boxes according to family size, curb side no-contact service, and to a couple of pantries suspending service completely.

Last and certainly not least, our lack of finances pushed Churches United to the brink of ceasing operations after nearly 60 years of serving the Quad Cities area.

Yet, in the midst of it all, God has showered Churches United with so many blessings and new opportunities that cause me to stand in awe of His awesomeness.

#### What does the process of donating deer meat to our pantries entail?

"The state (Illinois) actually has a program where they take donated deer meat and they supply it to the pantries and shelters. I have a similar process. The only difference is that mine is 100% free and stays local. The process is that I, throughout the year, raise funds through grants and donations for processing the meat. 100% of the proceeds goes directly into the processing fees. There's no overhead. There's no administrative fees. There's nothing. Once that money is secured and Churches United is gracious enough to be my accountant that kind of keeps everything clean and simple. Then hunters...what they can do if they harvest an extra deer or would like to donate a deer...all they have to do is drop it off at one of our donation sites. Those are Woodhull Locker in Woodhull, Illinois and Reason's Locker in Buffalo Prairie, IL Once they drop it off, all they do is just sign the book. There's no ask of any kind of donation or partial payment or anything. I take care of all the financials. Once we have enough...the meat is all ground into one pound burger: burger patties or burger packages. Once I have enough to get picked up, Betsy (CUQCA Associate Director) is gracious enough. She takes care of all the distribution through Churches United. I give Betsy a call and say we have 750 pounds of ground deer meat ready to go whenever you are available and Betsy coordinates the pick up. Then that meat stays right here locally."

#### Why do you work with Churches United?

"Because they're so respected in the Quad City Area. They not only have their finger on the pulse of who's in the most need but they also know whose got the freezer space to accommodate the meat to make sure that nothing is going to go to waste. They have the wherewithal to make the pick-up and the deliveries. They're also fantastic in the financial aspect of all my donations to make sure all the paper-work is done for the meat lockers. Churches United makes sure that everything stays honest and gets to where it needs to get."

#### Anything else?

"My two butchers are incredible."

"Betsy is the greatest."
